"What's Happening Here?"

Happy Anniversary Knox! Wow, what a long way you have come. This congregation has 184 years of heritage -that's older than anyone here! It began with Stanley Street Church in 1834, Knox Presbyterian Church in 1843, and the Wesleyan Methodist Church 1864. They joined together in this fine building in 1888, and you became Knox United Church of Canada in 1925.

So, let's look at some fun facts about our past, all of which we can find on our website today:

- Where will you find the inscription: "Erected in memory of the officers of the church by the Ladies Aid Society 1909." (Bell installed in 1909)
- When did the first woman preach from the pulpit? (Rev. Ida MacKenzie preached on March 12, 1950 -) ... and our first woman on session was 1976!
- When did we start preaching from the floor lectern? (1990. Donated in memory of Mrs. Agnes Brown)
- Two important symbols of our faith are our Communion Table and our Baptismal Font. Any ideas when these were dedicated to Knox? (1953, commissioned from a bequest by Mrs. George Easton.)

I encourage you to take some time after church to look at all the historical artifacts that have been placed out here is the sanctuary. There is no doubt that it is a beautiful building with lots of history. Some of our congregants are seventh generation "Knoxites;". If these walls could talk, there would be stories to tell.

Today, we want to celebrate those stories of who we are as a people of God.

As part of that celebration, I have invited some people to share their memories of "where we came from – stories of the past". So, I invite Susan, Shirley, John and Kate to come forward to share their stories:

Our scripture today talks about the "body of Christ being built up" (v12).

Paul is encouraging the early Ephesian Church to "grow as the body of Christ" (v 15).
